

## Guide for the Publication of Articles in *B.D.D.*

### Purpose

The periodical *B.D.D.* (*Bekhol Derakhekha Daehu*) aims in the first place to serve the needs of Torah-observant Jews who maintain contact with intellectual developments in secular culture and are interested in modern thinking and research. A significant body of such people exists nowadays, with a high level of general education. *B.D.D.* wishes to act as a vehicle for the dissemination of new ideas, and the expression of different approaches to the interaction between Torah and general scholarship. In addition, the journal caters to the *non-religious* intellectual who wishes to understand how Torah observers grapple with the challenges that science and general culture in the modern era present to them.

### Coverage

The periodical plans a wide coverage of different fields of scholarship. The editorial board welcomes articles in the exact sciences (mathematics, physics, chemistry, engineering), the life sciences (biology, medicine, psychology), the social sciences (economics, sociology, anthropology), the environmental sciences, humanities, and Judaica (philosophy, history, archeology, law, literature). Whilst the majority of articles are in Hebrew, it is possible to accommodate articles in English.

### Content

Two categories of article are envisaged. The first deals with new ideas in the area of Torah and scholarship, and although the articles are primarily designed for the specialist, it is hoped that they will be intelligible to a nonspecialist who is prepared to undertake some background reading.

The second category, aimed at a wider public, will consist of reviews and discussions of relevant topics. All articles submitted for publication will be sent to appropriate referees for approval.

### Readership

It is anticipated that *B.D.D.* will be of interest to Torah-observant Jews in universities, research establishments, and government institutions; to graduates of *Yeshivot Hesder*, and students in the top classes of high schools; and to all others concerned with the Torah-Madda interaction.

### Submission of Manuscripts

Two hard copies of the manuscript should be submitted in *double spacing*. Files should be saved as TXT or RTF. English and Hebrew abstracts of not more than 150 words should accompany each article, as well as the author's academic affiliation or address to be listed on the Contributors page, both in English and in Hebrew.
